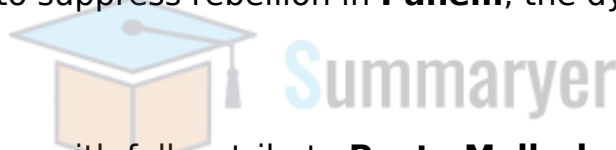


The Hunger Games
